

How to check a planning application

All the details of planning applications submitted to your local Borough Council, such as Charnwood, or Hinckley and Bosworth, are accessible on line. So if you are interested in looking to see what your near neighbours are proposing to do to their property, or following up any planning application that you may see displayed in a public place, or in the local papers, here is how to go about it provided you have use of the internet.

Enter www.charnwoodbc.gov.uk

Tab on Environment and Planning.

Tab on Development

Tab on Planning Application

Tab on Search for, view or make comment on, an application

Tab on Planning Explorer

Note disclaimer

Tab on General Search (If you know the planning application number you can tab on Quick Search)

When you enter the General Search page enter the parish, or ward, that you require and the range of dates that the application may have been submitted.

You will then have a printed list of all the applications for the parish over the time period that you specified. Tab on the application number of the planning that interests you and all the details will be available. You can look at the Planning Application, the supporting documents, the plans, list of consultees, constraints etc and if you wish to make a comment, when this should be submitted by. All comments are made on line and will be taken into account before the final decision is taken.

After the planning process has been completed you can check on the results and even read the conditions that may apply to a particular approval.



Regional Park for Charnwood?

The Friends of Charnwood Forest would welcome the creation of a Regional Park covering Charnwood Forest under the proposals being considered by the East Midlands Regional Assembly. Charnwood Forest has been part of the National Forest since it was created 11 years ago and forms its western boundary. There is a long-term view that the National Forest will eventually become a National Park and the Friends of Charnwood have submitted this as a proposal in the current Charnwood Local Development Plan.



Charnwood Forest has the highest number of Sites of Special Scientific Interest in Leicestershire and these sensitive areas need to be preserved from the added number of tourists and leisure activities that will surely follow the creation of a Regional Park. We would hope that the added planning restrictions on development would help to curb the continual erosion of the edges of the Forest such as the extension of the Science Park in Loughborough. This could be more conveniently sited off the new Rearsby by-pass than intruding into the Forest.

The M1 bisects Charnwood Forest and the twin threats of the proposed widening to eight lanes are, increased noise, and the proposal to introduce lighting over the full length of the motorway. Noise barriers are planned but light pollution is a real threat to wildlife. Forests and their nocturnal inhabitants need darkness to survive. The Friends of Charnwood Forest are opposing lighting of the motorway from junction 21 to 23 and we hope that the creation of a Regional Park will support our views.

Noise and lighting pollution! Fight, fight and fight again!

Charnwood Forest is a unique area and it is in everyone's interest to look ahead and support the added protection that a Regional Park can give provided that the area is not overwhelmed by the needs of visitors and tourists.
