Two Talks - not to be missed

GONE WITH THE WIND: the lost Windmills of Leicestershire by Mark Temple MONDAY 19th February

At one time every family's diet included bread which relied on a constant supply of fresh flour. So virtually every village had a mill of some sort, a watermill if there was a suitable stream, or if not, a windmill was placed on an elevated position where its sails could catch the wind. At their peak in 1835 there were believed to be 152 mills in Leicestershire, and many were locally such as Eaves, Markfield, Mountsorrel, Woodhouse Shepshed etc. Mark has tried to gather together all the photographic images that have survived and has also made a collection of milling stories. He knows of the existence of many mills but as far as he knows their images have been lost.



STAG'S HEAD SCULPTURE

Dick Howard updates us on this Newtown Linford project

Hopefully, by now, you will all know that the old dead oak tree stump on the left hand grass verge, when heading towards Anstey, will be carved into a tasteful and symbolic Stag's Head.

At the Thursday coffee and cakes morning on 11th January Peter



Leadbeater, the sculptor, explained to over 40 villagers how the tree will be carved, and he also answered questions. You can see on the sketch how imposing the stag's head will appear in profile, and it will be looking slightly towards Anstey. The actual sculpture will be influenced by the grainflow and a couple of soft spots will need to be avoided.

Peter, and his assistant, are planning to start the carving in the second week of March. The outer surface will be treated with preservative and it is recommended that this treatment is repeated on a four monthly cycle. With good care the carving will last from 30 to 50 years.

COMMITTEE NOTES

There had been difficulties finding convenient dates before Christmas and so the Committee which met on 16th January had some catching up to do.

- ◆ The principal concern was that the Committee would need strengthening by the time of the AGM as two members (Dick and Linda) in vital roles would be stepping down. Announcements would be made about this, with a view to filling vacancies at the AGM.
- ◆ Dick had, as always, unfailingly been filling the programme with speakers and events on interesting topics, as far ahead into the new year as possible, before he stepped down from this role which he had fulfilled for so long.
- ◆ In planning matters, it was agreed that the area around Iveshead Road was still under threat from housing development and a watchful eye was needed.
- ◆ The current proposals for extensions of the parking regulations in Newtown Linford were considered. Linked with this is the question of parking fees in Bradgate Park principally the fact that a full "all day" fee must always be paid, thus exacerbating the village parking problem.
- ◆ It was expected that the 'honesty box' parking fee collection in Swithland Woods may be replaced.
- ◆ Dick explained the current position with the Stag's Head Sculpture (see left).
- ◆ Membership numbers were fairly static which is quite usual for this time of year but it was pleasing to see considerable numbers of visitors coming to meetings as a result of the extensive publicity which Dick sent out to local media.
- ◆ Next meeting arranged for 12th March.
